



Dear Parents

Ayoba. Parfitt Road is open, parents' cars wear bright national flags in the exam-eased traffic, our girls have learned the diskie, our workers have each received a welcome yellow Bafana T-shirt, your principal has his tickets and Football Friday has been a feature of our term. The World Cup is here. So is winter.

Together with Grey, Eunice will be a designated World Cup parking area. Special floodlights have been erected and the area will be demarcated and manned by FIFA volunteers. We had meetings with numerous accommodation brokers over the last year with a view to Eunice's holiday hotel fund-raising during the World Cup but we decided to sign up with none of them and rather go it alone. With no team based in Bloemfontein we're hosting 80 FIFA volunteers for 16 days, a number of overnight stopover groups and we'll be open for business throughout the Bloemfontein leg of the tournament. We get new bookings every day. After that we'll be hosting 63 hockey teams in a smart local initiative which will bring U/18, U16 and U14 B and C girls and boys' provincial sides to Bloemfontein. Our sports staff, especially Mrs Louise Reinecke and Mr Leon van Rensburg will be busy this holiday. Parents may have mixed feelings about using Eunice House as a Hotel, but I can assure you that our positive, flexible and entrepreneurial approach, brilliantly managed by Mr Pat Uys and Ms Pamela Mayiyane, gives Eunice an edge in its drive to be a school with world class facilities without unpopular and unending school fundraising.

Earlier this month Mr Leon van Rensburg didn't make it to Johannesburg because of a cancelled flight. (I went to the airport to check because he's not the most willing flyer). He was to have attended the prestige National Science and Technology Forum dinner at Emperor's Palace where Eunice was honoured as the only FS school in the top 9 Mathematics and Physical Science school in SA. It was the third such award in succession - something which should make the Eunice community very proud. I include the certificate awarded to Eunice as an attachment. It's an impressive document. It does all the talking. No confusion about trophies here.

Now here's a five star achievement. Dessi Nikolov in Grade 12 has been selected to represent South Africa in the International Mathematical Olympiad which will take place in Kazakhstan from 5 - 14 July 2010. The South African Mathematics Foundation will cover Dessi's costs. There are 6 teenage Maths boffins in the team. We are referring here to Mathematics of a sublime standard with Dessi on Skype every day receiving coaching from experts at Universities far and wide. Dessi, you're an 'Angle'!

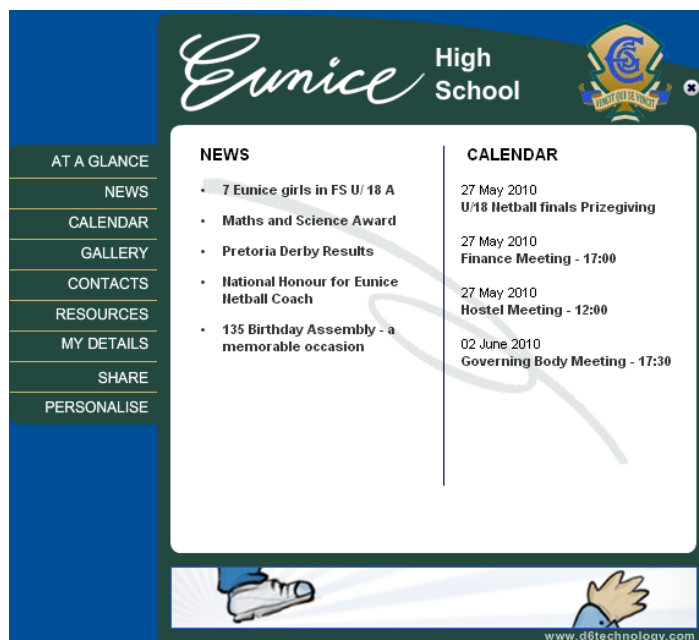
Anyone present at Eunice's 135 Birthday Assembly will long remember Margo de Vries's ( Matric 1999) account of her harrowing parachute accident; Grade 8 speaker Yumna Kalla's impressive message; Rize van Rooyen's moving holocaust poem; Peter Ross (Saints) and David Langford's (Grey) charismatic greetings to Eunice; the endearing presence of Pre-Primary's 4 year olds; the hugely impressive Eunice choir fresh from its A ++ at the Kunswedstryd; and the symbolic balloons released by our Matrics at the quad fountain. The Assembly did Eunice and its girls proud.

Amid stiff competition at the Bloemfontein Kunswedstryd at Grey College on Wednesday evening 5 May, the newly reconstituted Eunice choir, gave clear notice that they are aiming at a very high standard. Their performance earned them an A ++ which put Eunice and Grey on top with our two other local girls' schools closely behind us at A +. Congratulations to our girls, Mrs Retha Visser, Mrs Elza Vosloo and choir manager, Mrs Mag Marais.

Following an investigation into our Mathematics and Physical Science results over some years, Standard Bank has made a R 50 000 donation to these subjects. Following our Anglo sponsorship of R 700 000 to Eunice Mathematics in 2009/2010 the need is obviously in the field of Physical Science. This donation has been used to purchase three Smart interactive white boards for the three Physical Science teachers. This was a national Standard Bank initiative which targeted 114 schools which are successful in producing quality previously disadvantaged, potential scarce - skilled graduates.

On Tuesday, 11 May Eunice hosted the Rotary Careers Day. Nearly 500 Grade 11s from Eunice, St Andrew's, St Michael's, Oranje and Brebner spent two hours in over 40 different groups each facilitated by a practising professional specially recruited by the Bloemfontein Raadzaal Rotary Club. Grade 11s had the chance to interact with three such professionals in first, second and third choice sessions. Thanks to Dr Don Paine, co-ordinator of the project, Mrs Maureen Botha and Mrs June Norval for catering, Rotarians and the participating professionals.

The revolutionary interface technology of the School Communicator makes it an amazingly fast and free way of reaching a wider school community. A very lucky group of 44 Eunice girls leave tomorrow for their long awaited European Tour. Every second year Mrs Mag Marais and her husband, Francois, put together a highly educational and magical tour on the same tried and tested itinerary. They fly via Cairo to Rome and on to Assisi, Florence, Pisa, Lido di Jesolo (Venice), Chamonix, Paris, Calais, London and home via Cairo. Some of

their included extras are the Vatican, Colosseum, Roman Forum, Accademia ( Florence), glass factory and gondola ride ( Venice), Mout Blanc, the Louvre, Eiffel Tower, perfume museum, Eurodisney, Eurostar, Thames cruise, Science Museum, Madame Tussauds, Globe Theatre, Sister Act at the Palladium and the London Eye! The group includes Dr and Mrs Paine and four of the girls' parents.

Eunice's 10 year old Leader Project has been completed for the year 2010. Our 165 girls were divided into 15 groups. After a day's training, careful planning and caring involvement the groups implemented their plans. Each group was given R 1 500 to get them going (this project is funded by Mrs Marais' Christmas Market.) An awards assembly will be held next term. What impresses me about our ten year old Leader Project initiative is:

- the inclusivity: the way we can persuade almost every single one of our matrics to participate.
- the exposure: there is real educational value in opening minds and informing opinion by exposing girls to the country's dire needs in such a personal way.
- the whole school commitment: Mrs Marais gives so much of her time, her creativity and her gift for quality planning to our Leader Project vision, but it requires substantial involvement from teachers and support staff in terms of time, co-ordination, guidance, resources and, especially, school transport.
- the value: whereas our projects make a difference in communities according to varying degrees of effectiveness, our girls gain an experience which adds value to their CV's and allows them to speak with sincerity and detail when it comes to selection interviews. We get substantial feedback on this advantage.
- the experience: so much of our universities' focus these days is on service learning and our girls have such an edge in this regard when they put their Leader Project experience to use in a tertiary context.

Below is a summary of the 15 Leader Projects which our 2010 matric class have undertaken. We are not altogether happy with the overall standard this year. We will spend time reviewing and refining our plans for 2011.

1. Euphoria ( Teacher: Karin Kok; Co-ordinator: Dinki Kroukamp)

This group arranged a unique fun day for the children of the Bolokanang Youth Care Centre at Pellies Park. The children were led through four activity stations; material painting where they made pillowcases; track races with a real starting gun!; a popular jumping castle; a food stall where, among other delights, the children decorated their own cupcakes.

2. Mamma's House ( Teacher: Leanne Singh; Co-ordinator: Lauren Dell)

Mamma's House is a house for abandoned children and young prostitutes. This group decided to provide the home with a vegetable garden. The girls planted seedlings, made creative plastic watering cans, painted vegetable name boards. They also revamped a table tennis table, gave the house a new name board, provided 10 blankets and a supply of food.

3. Peace to Kgotsong ( Teacher: Mrs Norah Tuckett; Co-ordinator: Michaella Morphis)

Partnering with a group of UFS Medical students, these girls targeted the Khotsong Creche in Mangaung which serves 36 children between the ages of 2 – 6 from 08:30 – 16:00. The girls themselves sewed 18 purple covers for the foam mattresses. They laid a brick square outside the classroom and painted hopscotch in a variety of colours, donated and decorated big dustbins, installed 4 old school chalkboards, new plates, cups and spoons, and a new book-laden corner. Each child received a long sleeve T-shirt, beanie, activity books, crayons and, of course, chips and cold drinks.

4. Shooting the Stars ( Teacher: Mrs Rani Schutte; Co-ordinator: Martiné van der Merwe)

This group of sportswomen decided to arrange a coaching outing for the children of Tjhabelang school. Besides donating poles and hockey sticks, the girls invited the school to Eunice. They also donated books, clothes, food ,stationery packs and the girls arranged fun activities on the astro and netball courts. There was a prizegiving, certificates, photos; dancing and plenty of Energade!

5. Hands On ( Teacher: Mrs Hester Steyn; Co-ordinator: Imanuella Muller)

This group went out to Oreratile Adra Care to prepare and share a delicious meal as a token of fellowship. Besides the usual face painting, games and food donation, the girls prepared a traditional braai consisting of boerewors, chicken and chops with pap and sous, spaghetti and salads. Why wasn't I invited!

6. Harvesting Hope ( Teacher: Mrs Sandra van Rensburg; Co-ordinator: Marnette Brewis)

Also partnering with the UFS (Prof LD van Rensburg; Dept of Soil, Crop and Climate Sciences) this group provided very technical and practical assistance to the Yadê Tuistes' vegetable garden in the form of a rain harvesting project. These girls dug holes for pipes, installed a 25 00 Jojo Tank, fitted taps and provided seedlings and fertilizer. This project will be extended and enlarged by post-grad agriculture students.

7. Building on Beliefs ( Teacher: Dr Don Paine; Co-ordinator: Abigaile Nel)

The group focused on giving physical, practical and emotional assistance to the Norah Day Care Centre. Some girls did the painting while others worked on making colouring-in and songbooks. Besides the customary party, the girls entertained the children and presented a parcel to each one.

8. Headstart ( Teacher: Mrs Joy Kroon; Co-ordinator: Bojosi Morule)

This year's theme was 'Sharing Your Talent' and this group took the challenge literally and very practically. They made themselves available to the learners of Headstart High School for two hour sessions on Tuesdays and Thursdays. To solve textbook issues they compiled a pack of study notes for 4 modules as well as past exam papers. In Maths they've covered financial mathematics, exponents, number systems and patterns; and in Science: organic chemistry and projectile motions.

9. The Mommy Helpers ( Teacher: Mrs Mag Marais Co-ordinator: Santi Wu)

Helping a baby crèche was not an easy mission for this group as there were a number of mishaps in store such as transport and a colour dispute regarding the painting. But the girls rallied together and made baby wraps and curtains for the six rooms. They also arranged a stalk tea/ baby shower with special items for each baby.

10. Hofana ( Teacher: Mrs Nadine Honiball; Co-ordinator: Margo Fargo)

The Talitha Cumi Children Centre in Heidedal was the focus of this group's attention. Five activities were arranged: girls manned a colouring table, face painting, clay modelling, soccer ,netball and dancing. The girls used their newly acquired disk dancing skills to allow the children to experience the soccer fever.

11. Stepping Stones ( Teacher: Mrs Mag Marais; Co-ordinator: Tshogofatso Toolo)

Another Tutor Class group. For a period of eight weeks these girls offered two hour classes on Mondays and Wednesdays to the matrics at Sehunelo High School. In the first two weeks they covered six subjects and then narrowed them down to 4 for the last month to ensure maximum assistance.

12. Imphamiseng ( Teacher: Mrs L Neethling; Co-ordinator: Megan van Gensen)

Batho Primary School has been recently upgraded by the Province. This group provided a range of interesting extras: they painted the front wall of the school, provided carpets, poufs, (filled) bookshelves, educational toys, posters and stationery. Furthermore they provided on –going computer training (and books) to Batho's teachers in Eunice's IT Lab. On their presentation day they painted dustbins, ran a Batho's Got Talent Show, introduced the children to public speaking and to the Diski. When the Premier opened the revamped school, our girls were invited!

13. Because They're Awesome ( Teacher: Mrs Marthie de Wet; Co-ordinator: Lisa Holtzhausen)

This group used their drama skills to bring to life a variety concert presented by the children of Lebone Land. Using the children themselves as actors and directors, the show included drama pieces, songs of praise, folksongs and gumboots. Their lasting contribution to Lebone Land was the donation of two microphones, two speakers, an amplifier and a mixer.

14. Perisseou ( Teacher: Mrs Shomenay Wesso; Co-ordinator: Heidemarie Christ)

Spending three afternoons at the Perisseou Creche, the girls repainted the playground and front wall of the crèche. They sponsored a plumber's work on the crèche's toilets and made curtains and toilet covers and mats. An afternoon of varied activities and donations was enjoyed by both Eunice girls and the Creche children.

15. Young at Heart ( Teacher: Mrs Mag Marais; Co-ordinator: Jessica Woodrow)

Taking time with the elderly was the theme of this group. They went out of their way to pamper, spoil and entertain the senior citizens of Mooihawe Old Age Home. Spending quality time with the ladies, the girls gave them hand massages and manicures, arranged both a bracelet making afternoon and a cupcake icing session. Throughout the project they forged special relationships with the ladies and learned valuable life lessons.

Totally on their own initiative our matrics, for the second year now, arrange what they call the Matric Promise. In committing themselves to Eunice's high standards all 165 girls gathered in a circle on the field, fixed a small note detailing their goals to a helium-filled balloon, listened to a motivational speaker from their own ranks (Laura Ann Fox) and to a promise written and read by Duduetsang Kodisang before their balloons' upwardly mobile journey.

Our Father and Daughter Dinner, planned for Thursday night, 5 August is our PA's one major initiative this year which challenges our parents to involve themselves in our school in the company of their daughters. The cost is R 160 per couple. Come on Dads, take the initiative, score some points, don't wait to be persuaded. This is not a fundraiser. It's a project our PA considers important.

Bookings at Liza-Anne Meyer

It was a busy sports term which began with the long journey to the National Girls' Schools' Festival in Stellenbosch ( 23 - 26 April) in a packed bus. But it was certainly worthwhile. Both our hockey and tennis girls came out on top in tough competition which included 20 top Girls' Schools' throughout South Africa. Playing stylish, structured hockey despite losing 4 senior players to SA schools and FS U/21, our girls played 13 games and conceded only 1 goal on the road to the final against the host school, Rhenish whom we beat 1 - 0. Thalia Kritzas was the player of the tournament, Kerry Trebble our top goal scorer and Nicole Walraven our standout player in defence.

The tennis girls cruised to the final with convincing victories over Clarendon ( EL), Collegiate ( PE), Durban Girls' High School, Parktown ( JHB) and Potchefstroom. In the final they came up against Bloemhof from Stellenbosch. We had beaten them twice in 2010 at both Sun City in January and the Gerrie Berner Tournament in Paarl in March. Those victories were facilitated by the presence of Christi Potgieter. Without Christi on Federation Cup duty in Armenia, Marizanne Boucher made the court her own and earned the honour of player of the tournament. Having drawn the singles 2 - 2 against Bloemhof our girls combined well to take both doubles matches and the National Girls' Schools' title. The squash girls also reached the semi finals where they were narrowly beaten by

Collegiate ( PE). Suné Seale, Eunice's number 1 squash player and a top 10 SA U /19 player, was named one of the top 5 players of the tournament. The chess girls were narrowly beaten into second place with Anjurie de Wet being joint player of the tournament and Lechelle Badenhorst unbeaten on the number 2 board. Our public speaking and debating girls were kept extremely busy preparing and competing from morning till night. Headgirl, Nnete Malebo, was our stand out speaker. The Netball girls made the semi finals where they were narrowly beaten by Paarl Girls' High 28- 26 after being down 11 - 2. They had won 6 out of 7 pool matches. Joané Bredenkamp was our stand out player. She was named defender of the tournament with Ashleigh Botha earning one of the tournaments 2 commendations for Sportsmanship.

On 14 / 15 May we hosted our annual derby against Pretoria High School for Girls. Nearly 400 girls and staff arrived in 7 buses and stayed in local accommodation (Reyneke Park, Lakeview, Guesthouses). Unlike Grey we host only once a year and travel once. But we do it in style hosting all our guests and our boarders in the Eunice House dining room. Unfortunately the first team netball match had to be cancelled due to a wet surface. Let me do justice to all the results. Eunice won the squash 7 - 5 and the chess 5 - 1. PHSG won the Senior Debate and Eunice won the Junior Debate. In Public Speaking the Prepared Speeches: PHSG won seniors and Eunice won juniors. Impromptu Speeches: Eunice won the seniors and juniors. Eunice only lost 1 set in the tennis. The Pretoria girls, you'll notice, no longer come by train. We're off the Clarendon in East London on 30 July and we've been weighing up options in the light of inexplicable developments in the running of Shozolozza Meyl, South Africa's national passenger train service provider. When we went to East London in 2008 the train cost us R 150 000. The quote for the train in 2010 is R 445 000. This will mean a cost of about R 1 400 per pupil! So, we've been forced to investigate the bus option which obviously includes the added cost of accommodation in East London. The 30 July EL Derby will cost **R 600 per pupil**. We'll use the bus option as a carefully planned experiment in 2010 with a view to making decisions for the future. At the request of parents we have tried to secure luxury buses rather than the ordinary work-horses. It's not easy to ensure these for such a big group but we'll try. The added cost of the luxury option will be borne by the school.

Eunice's full time netball organizer and first team coach, Ms Dorette Badenhorst, has been appointed coach of the SA U/21 team. She recently coached the FS U/19 team which won the inter provincial championships and she is also the defence coach of the Cheetah Netball team which won the National League last week. In the space of two years she has raised the profile of the sport at Eunice and has registered victories over the big Bloemfontein Afrikaans schools. At last we can compete at the highest level. 9 of our 16 teams have qualified for the semi-finals of their leagues to be played on 20 July. Our young teams are coming through and the First Team is holding its own. First team scores this season: Eunice 27 - 27 Jim Fouche Eunice 22- 30 Sentraal Eunice 25- 34 Oranje Eunice 19 - 18 Sand du Plessis. Having reached the semis for two years in a row it was our stated goal in 2010 to break into the Top Three in Bloemfontein. We were outclassed in our semi-final encounter against Oranje losing 33 - 16, but last Saturday morning we showed that Eunice netball has arrived. Losing first team captain and goal shooter, Danielle Gouws, to illness was a blow, but Grade 8 shooter Kylin Fourie proved an inspired choice as a replacement. It was a privilege to be present to watch Eunice go head-to-head with JF and emerge victorious by a margin of 33 - 27. Third place. Mission accomplished. Thanks girls, Ms Dorette Badenhorst, Mrs Lanelle Kleinhans and your team of helpers. Incidentally, Kylin has been selected to represent the free State U/14 A netball team this holiday. This team represents the entire province. Mabu Pula ( U/19), Tebogo Moleme ( U/16) and Ashleigh Botha ( U/17) represented Southern Free State at the All ages Tournament in Gauteng.

I presume that the temporary traffic solutions provided by the municipality and the contractors (the university gate through Grey and the Grey/ Eunice access gate) during the major roadworks project will no longer be available when school reopens after the World Cup. We have some measure of control over the Badenhorst Street entrance/ exit at Eunice House and we'll endeavour to keep that open at peak times each day. The contractors tell me that work on the Nelson Mandela/ Parfitt intersection and the widening of Nelson Mandela (between Melville Drive and Third Avenue) will commence after the World Cup.

It's a five week holiday. Parents are urged to support the school's zero tolerance policy on hair colouring and to use the holiday to clean uniforms, repair shoes and bags and return ready for school. Grade 11s have been given Matric uniform 2011 letters which require orders by 14 July and payment by 3 September. Please give attention to this. Here's a letter I've written to matrics which Grades 10 - 11 girls can take to heart, too:

### **Five** Points for **Five** Weeks

1. The FIFA World Cup is slapbang in the middle of your Matric year. It's a historic celebratory occasion, but it's also a diversion from the serious business of building a quality matric. Embrace the patriotic atmosphere; enjoy the world's premier football spectacle, but **DON'T** PACK THE SCHOOLBAG AWAY till 13 July.

2. Decide what you want in terms of results; what you need in terms of entry to a course; and decide what you need to do to get there.
3. Make a list of Matric priorities for the holiday, eg. this project or that painting; this setwork or that chapter; that section you've just never fully understood or that extra exam past paper you need to ensure your symbol.
4. Remember that 50 % is non-negotiable in every subject. If you're not there yet, this is the time to put in that extra effort.
5. You're not being challenged to put in 8 hour block days. If you've earned it – and most of you have – have a complete break for 10 days, then get working on your list. You may need just 1 hour a day, maybe two on days when you're tackling something big. But, don't procrastinate. It's matric; let's do it

In many ways you are an excellent matric class with talent, enthusiasm and energy. It's your individual and collective work ethic which will take you to the next level. Some of our busiest girls are our best performers, too. If you haven't been giving your all, now's the time to show that you've got what it takes to get busy with the business of achieving YOUR matric goals.

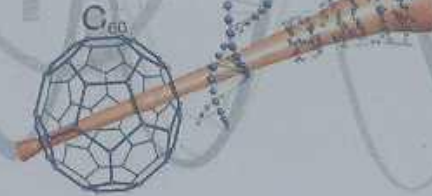
